My mother, Margie (who is in every one of those Boys Club photos), was a singer on Yiddish radio as a teen. She recognized early on that Alan could sing and she taught him well how to perform.

But the *Award* was what launched Alan's very successful show business career, which has now reached 60 years! After he won, he was in the original cast of "Oliver" on Broadway, and he has not stopped working since. Below is a photo taken on the day he won the award.
